# What is the Manitoba School Boards Association?

The Manitoba School Boards Association is a voluntary association of Manitoba's public school boards. These school boards pay an annual membership fee to access services and programs that the Manitoba School Boards Association offers to help them fulfill their mandate of managing the public education system in their communities.

The Manitoba School Boards Association's policy direction is established by its membership through the resolutions process at its Annual Convention. Between Conventions, the Association is governed by an elected 11-member Provincial Executive. Each member of the Provincial Executive is a school trustee who currently serves on a Manitoba school board. The Provincial Executive is supported by the Association staff. The Association office is at 191 Provencher Boulevard in Winnipeg.

# What does the Manitoba School Boards Association do?

The Manitoba School Boards Association provides a range of programs and services for all school boards, programs and services which otherwise might not be available or affordable to individual school boards.

### These include:

- labour relations and human resource management
- risk management
- trustee education
- employee benefit plans
- property and liability insurance
- policy development

The Manitoba School Boards Association also provides a common voice with which Manitoba's school boards can speak to governments or other organizations at the local, provincial, or national levels on issues of interest or concern.

# **About Roles and Responsibilities**

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The primary role of a school board is to govern the schools under its jurisdiction in accordance with all legal requirements, while at the same time reflecting community beliefs and values.

The major legal obligations of school boards are described in provincial laws such as The Public Schools Act and The Educational Administration Act. School boards are also bound by federal and provincial legislation in areas such as human rights and privacy protection.

Community beliefs and values are reflected in policy that school boards develop. Policy "customizes" local schools within a common legal framework. Policy touches on many aspects of school operations. It may expand upon provincial graduation requirements, provide bus transportation to students other than those for whom that service is legally required, or offer locally developed courses or programs. Within a school division, school board policy has the weight of law.

Because school trustees are not usually professional educators, school boards employ experts to assist them as part of a management team. Two key positions are the superintendent and the secretary-treasurer.

The superintendent is a professional educator, while the secretary-treasurer is a school division's financial officer.

The school board, superintendent, and secretary-treasurer work together closely to ensure that a community's schools are managed in a educationally sound, fiscally responsible and responsive manner.

# **About Funding Education**

School boards manage the school system with funding from two principal sources. The provincial government provides annual operating grants to school divisions. The amount of money received by each school division is based on a complex formula that takes into account factors such as the number of students overall and the number of these with special needs, size of schools, and the local tax base. The remaining operating funds come primarily from the local levy, which is a tax on property collected by municipalities on behalf of school boards.
