Cassie Campbell-Pascall is one of the greatest hockey players in Canadian history. During her 16-year career, she rewrote history and created a pathway for women in sport.

A career started with two unsuccessful attempts at being selected to join Team Canada in 1990 and 1992, Cassie fought through adversity to earn her way on the team in 1994. She went on to become one of Canada's most decorated hockey players of all-time, winning three gold medals and capturing eight World Championships.

Following retirement, Cassie joined Hockey Night in Canada's broadcast team and was quickly called up to become the first woman to do colour commentary on Hockey Night in Canada. Covering commentary for three Olympic Games, Cassie is currently an analyst for ESPN and a Special Advisor for the PWHL.

Her breakaway into sport media & creating opportunities to advance the women's game is the next phase for the trailblazer to stamp her legacy in hockey.

A1/B1 — The role of trustees in fostering safe and healthy work and learning environments. Presenter: Kathleen Lane
Location: Room 2E, RBC Convention Centre

Across the country education leaders are realizing that fostering wellbeing in our schools and school systems is the key to unlocking the transformational power of public education. Students learn best when they are well. When staff are well, they can do their best work. While the benefits are clear, the path towards fostering wellbeing in K-12 education is complex. In this interactive session, we will:

- Examine pan-Canadian trends that are affecting the wellbeing of students and staff in our school divisions,
- Explore the connections between student and staff wellbeing, and consider how these relate to the goals of our education system,
- Appreciate how actions to create healthier work environments can help attract and retain staff,
- Identify actions that school board trustees can take to foster healthier work and learning environments within their school division and across the province.

Presenter Bio: Kathleen is the Executive Director for the EdCan Network, where she previously served as the Program Director for Well at Work. As the Executive Director Kathleen provides strategic leadership to the organization, leading the program management and partnership development. She is particularly interested in creating ecosystems where people can flourish and the role of K-12 education in creating a better future for all.

Kathleen studied population health before earning her Master of Business Administration from the University of British Columbia. She managed two cross-campus research projects to understand how the learning environment affects student mental health and wellbeing. Focused on bridging the theory-to-practice gap, Kathleen presented findings from her research into teaching practices that support student learning and wellbeing at the International Conference for Health Promoting Universities and Colleges and developed instructor resources to support implementation of instructional practices that promote student wellbeing. Over the past several years her work has focused on building management and leadership capacity to support healthy and productive workplaces.

A2/B2 — Governance in the Age of AI, Presenter: Kirsten Thompson

Artificial intelligence (AI) is transforming education, presenting new opportunities and challenges for school governance. This workshop provides an essential introduction to AI, demystifying how it works and exploring its implications for Manitoba's education system. Participants will review current guidance on AI use in Manitoba, examine critical privacy and security considerations, and discuss how AI concerns intersect with existing board policies and procedures. Emphasizing the importance of flexible, principles-based guidelines over rigid procedures, this session equips school board members with the knowledge to navigate AI's integration responsibly and effectively in their communities.

Presenter Bio: Kirsten serves as the divisional Coordinator of ICT for the Mountain View School Division; overseeing technology programming and purchasing for approximately 3000 stakeholders. She is a Microsoft Education Trainer as well as a Level 1 Google Certified Educator with over 250 hours of combined professional development on how to assist educators in the use of these tools. Prior to this, she was employed as a classroom teacher in the Turtle River School Division for 6 years where she taught a variety of subjects ranging from Grade 7-12. Kirsten has completed all the required course work as she works towards a Ph.D in the area of educational software evaluation. This work was started at the University of Regina under the supervision of Dr. Alec Couros.

A3/B3 — Climate Leadership in Manitoba School Boards

Presenter Bios:

Heather Eckton has devoted over twenty years to public education and is an advocate for amplifying student voices. Currently, she serves as the Climate Action Divisional Teacher Team Leader in Seven Oaks School Division, supporting climate action across 28 K-12 schools. Heather is also an active member of Educators for Climate Action (eca) Manitoba, the UNESCO Associated Schools Project Network in Manitoba, and the founder of the Sustainable Living Academy Manitoba (SLAM). She is a SSHRC Doctoral Fellow at the University of Manitoba, where her research focuses on excellence in climate change education and transformational learning.

Will Burton is a lecturer in social and environmental methods courses for pre-service and in-service teachers in the Faculty of Education at the University of Winnipeg. He has a decade of experience in the Manitoba K-12 public education system including at the elementary and senior years, in traditional and alternative learning environments, as both a classroom teacher and principal-teacher. Will's current interest and scholarship focuses on place-based pedagogies, climate change education, and interdisciplinary approaches to the K-12 curriculum. Enrolled at Lakehead University's Ph.D in Educational Studies program, under the guidance of Dr. Ellen Field, his dissertation focuses on the design and facilitation of place-based pedagogies in the K-12 Manitoba education system.

A4/B4 — Building Capacity for our Future

Succession planning helps to ensure that boards are prepared for board members to come and go from the board. Even outside of an election year, boards can do much to promote their work with members of the community. The more people see and understand the board's role in providing for the educational needs of the community's school-aged children, the more likely they will be to put themselves forward for election. To help boards achieve that goal, the association launched a mentorship program (BC4F) in 2022 to recruit and support a more diverse array of candidates to run as candidates in school board elections held that year. Picking up on that theme in preparation for the 2026 elections, this session will provide guidance in general recruitment practices, involving your community, building relationships and running targeted campaigns.
